

BARS SUFFRAGE PINK TEAS.

Women's Union Now Will Confine
Its Work to the Men.

Mrs. Harriot Stanton Blatch, President of the Women's Political Union, announced yesterday that her organization from now until after election day would work only with the men of the State.

"No more pink teas," said Mrs. Blatch, "but direct work with the voters."

Miss Jane Pincus, the union organizer, is arranging with organizations of men to receive suffrage speakers, and the offer has been accepted. Red Men, Eagles, Masons, Knights of Columbus, Elks, Foresters, and Chambers of Commerce have opened their doors to the women and listened to them favorably.

Miss Helen Todd has been the speaker through the southern part of the State. Workers will be sent to other parts, and the union hopes to cover the State by Election Day, getting a hearing from all the organizations of men.

The Woman Suffrage Party is to hold a school for watchers in the Country Life Exposition Hall, in the Grand Central Terminal, on April 14 and 15, with men identified with election reform movements in charge, including some from the Honest Ballot Association, others from the Citizens' Union, and one from each of the various political parties.

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
